Bruce Springsteen

Bruce Springsteen was born on 23rd September in 1949 in Freehold, New Jersey.

In the 1980s Bruce became one of the leading rock singers. Bruce Springsteen started making music at the age of 14.

He founded several bands.

In 1972 he got his first contract. His first LP "Greetings from Asbury Park" came out in 1973. "Born To Run" was his first hit in the charts in 1975.

He had his first top 10 hit in 1980 with "Hungry Heart".

"Dancing In The Dark", "Cover Me" and "Born In The USA", 1984, "I'm On Fire", "Glory Days", "I'm Going Down" and "My Hometown" are all top 10 hits from the LP "Born In The USA".

In the USA alone this LP was sold 12 million times.

In 1994 Bruce Springsteen got an Oscar for "Streets Of Philadelphia", the title song of the "aids" film "Philadelphia".

For this song he got four Grammy awards in 1995: Song Of The Year, Best Male Rock Vocal Performance, Best Rock Song and Best Song Written Specifically For A Motion Picture.

Also in 1995 his album "Greatest Hits" was re-released on which 14 of his most successful hits are to be found besides four new songs.

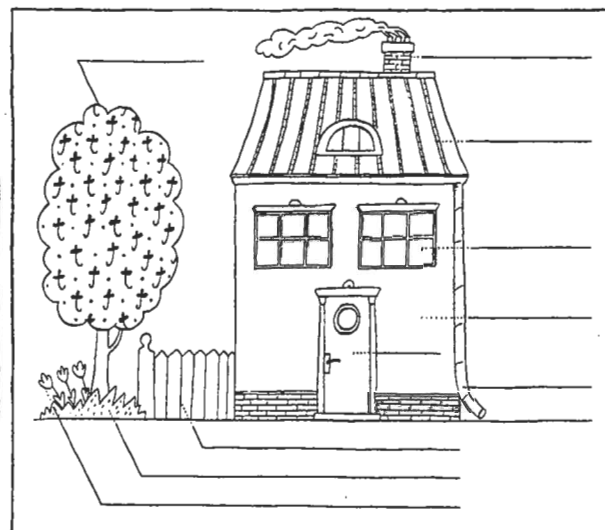

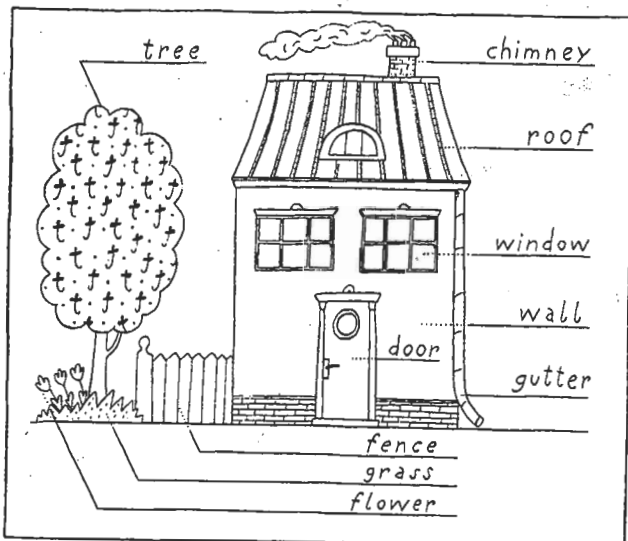

Lösungen



"Winding cards" are an amusing way of learning English. It's quite easy. First you cut out the shape from your worksheet. Then you stick it on a piece of thicker paper or card. You fix a 1 m long piece of string at the upper end of your winding card. Now you are ready. You start at the upper end on the left-hand side. Put your string into the first nick. On the right-hand side you must find the matching item, e.g.: "Where can you eat out?" - "At a pet shop." (That's a joke.) Then you put the string into this nick on the right-hand side. From here you wind the string across the back of your winding card to the second item on the left. You then find the matching item on the right and so on. At the end you will have a pattern on the back of your winding card. Your teacher will tell you whether you are right or wrong.
